

Introduced on "Cannonball" Adderley's Cannonball's Bossa Nova in 1962. Both composers, Ferreira and Einhorn, were from Brazil; Ferreria a guitarist and Einhorn an improviser on the jazz harmonica. Combined with the powerful tenor saxophone of Adderley the album is required listening for an fan of Latin American music. The infectious **Clouds** is the opening track on this timeless album.

**Performance notes:** A steady left hand will greatly add to the dance feel of this piece. After establishing the melody in the right hand, improvisation is encouraged. But, always keep the tempo steady!
